Just to highlight a few things that are different to previous Shows – firstly, the Fun Dog Show is back again by popular demand! Also, as with the 2021 Show;

## Table Tennis

Our current Table Tennis Club has now been running for over 3 years. Now the weather is improving with lighter nights, we would like to encourage more juniors to play, 7pm to 8pm, on a Wednesday evening. If it's warm and there's no wind we'll put up a table in the car park, otherwise they can play in the Hall. ## Hall Improvements

Our new kitchen is finished and those who've seen or used it seem pleased with the additional facilities. It's recently been used by professional caterers for a number of events.



We've also installed an insulated acoustic tiled ceiling throughout the Hall which has vastly improved its acoustic performance and should enable us to keep the Hall warmer and for a longer period. Music, Drama and Cinema events will benefit from these improvements.

54 new folding chairs arrived in May to replace the blue fabric ones we have. They had started to show their age, and the new ones have a better quality fabric, are lightweight and take up less storage space.

Our Film Matinees have been running, generally on the first Monday of the Month since the Autumn, and with Film Night hopefully restarting this Autumn, we've decided to install a new screen which will mean we no longer have to use a painted wall. This will give a sharper, clearer picture. It'll be installed in July.

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## Charge of the Light Brigade

This military disaster occurred on 25 October 1854 during the Crimean War when the Light Brigade of about 600 men charged "half a league" up the wrong valley straight towards a battery of Russian guns near Balaclava.

The army officers responsible were the overall commander, Lord Raglan, the commander of the cavalry, Lord Lucan, and Lord Cardigan who was in charge of the Light Brigade. Between them and Captain Nolan (who verbally transmitted the order to attack to Lord Cardigan) the "noble 600" were sent to attack the wrong target. Only about 60 soldiers survived to return to the British line, the rest having been killed, wounded or taken prisoner.


One of the survivors was Stephen Binnington (some records have Bennington) who was born in Lockington. When he enlisted as a Private with the 11th Hussars (part of the Light Brigade) at Beverley Barracks (now the site of Morrisons) in 1834 he gave his age as 19. His Baptism record is dated 1818 so perhaps he added three years to his age in order to join the army?

He married Eliza Moore at Hulme, Manchester, in 1848 and retired from the army with the rank of Corporal, at his own request, in 1859.

According to the 1861 census he lived in Osmotherley aged 45 (and is listed as a Chelsea Pensioner with three children). By 1871 he had four children and a housekeeper, his wife apparently having died. His own death is recorded in 1880 at Ulverston aged 62.

Of mild interest, perhaps, is the fashion connection with balaclava, raglan and cardigan.
